Sweden is a global leader in human rights and social equality, committed to improving the lives of persons with disabilities and ensuring their full inclusion in society. Approximately 15% of our population, or about 1.5 million people, live with some form of disability. To support these individuals, the Swedish government allocates significant resources to social welfare programs annually. Nearly 98% of public buildings in Sweden are accessible, and our education system includes tailored support programs for students with disabilities. As a result, more than 80% of individuals with disabilities complete their education, and 70% participate in the workforce. Sweden not only focuses on its national policies but also takes an active role in promoting equality and accessibility on a global scale. These efforts reflect our unwavering commitment to building a fairer and more inclusive world for everyone.
