Armenia is a developing country. The modern Republic of Armenia became independent in 1991 with the dissolution of the Soviet Union. Yerevan is the capital and largest city of the Armenia as one of the world's oldest continuously inhabited cities. Situated along the Hrazdan River, Yerevan is the administrative, cultural, and industrial center of the country, as its primate city.

Social workers operating in two safe areas created by UNICEF with its partners in Goris, which can serve up to 300 children a day, say that children struggle with intense feelings of sadness, anxiety, fear and anger, expressing themselves through nightmares, bedwetting and inconsolable crying. He stated that they did. Others are unable to express their emotions or relate to the situation around them.

More than 30,000 Armenian children have arrived in Armenia since the escalation of fighting two weeks ago. In addition to displacement, children arriving in Armenia lacked access to education and lived in an unsafe environment where families feared attack.

UNICEF is working with the Government of Armenia and other partners to help refugee children access the care and support they need to overcome the challenges they face. UNICEF, together with the Ministry of Health, has established mobile pediatric teams across the country to ensure screenings are conducted to identify and respond to mental health needs.”

At this point, we, as the UN, request the necessary support from you so that these children do not feel the effects of war and crisis. UN support is important for us in financing the social support centers to be established. Additionally, what needs to be done for these children should be discussed here.
